Basic Strategies for Searching Electronic Resources

BOOLEAN OPERATORS are used to connect keywords.

AND is used to narrow a search. Both terms **must** be present in the article to be retrieved.

Example: *dogs and fleas* will retrieve articles that contain both terms.

OR is used to broaden a search. Either term **may** be present.

Example: *dogs or canines* will retrieve articles containing either term. (Note: an "or" is a useful way to connect synonyms to improve the results of the search.)

NOT is used to exclude a term.

Example: *dogs not puppies* will retrieve articles containing the word dogs. It will not retrieve articles about dogs that have the word puppies in them. (Note: Be cautious when using "not." Useful information may be excluded.)

TRUNCATION allows for searching different forms of a word. A truncation symbol, usually ? or *, can be added to the root of the word to retrieve all possible endings. Consult online help to identify the truncation symbol used in that database.

Example: *comput?* Will retrieve *compute*, *computer*, *computerized*, etc.

PHRASE SEARCHING. A phrase is a group of words used together to express a single meaning. Some electronic databases allow you to click on a button or use a pull-down menu to specify that the terms should be searched as a phrase. Others allow you to enclose the phrase in double quotations. Some search engines interpret the words entered as a phrase. Others will automatically connect your terms with Boolean "ands" or "ors."

Example: "gone with the wind"
