### Online Databases vs. Internet

Online databases and what we call Internet sources are both accessed through the Internet but are not the same thing. The library subscribes to or has access to online databases that contain print materials such as complete books or chapters from books, journal, magazine and newspaper articles in electronic format. These databases are available on campus computers. They can also be used at home but require passwords that can be obtained at the library or through the information for distance education students in Blackboard.

In most cases Internet sources are web pages that have been created exclusively for the Internet. An example of this is the CCCC website. These websites are usually accessible by anyone and can be located by using a search engine like Google.

Combines in one timely database all the fund and stock information necessary for indepth research. Comprehensive information on both mutual funds and stocks. Each fund and stock report is loaded with critical data and decisive analysis.

# **America's Newspapers**

Full-text content of 10 U.S. newspapers, each the complete electronic edition of record. Each paper provides unique coverage of local and regional news, including companies, politics, sports, industries, cultural activities, and people in the community. Paid ads are excluded. In addition, several North Carolina newspapers are offered.



Need help and the library isn't open? Remember NCknows. This service allows North Carolina citizens to get help from librarians and use library resources from their computer. NCknows is staffed by librarians from academic, public and specialty libraries. A person can log on to NCknows and chat with a librarian twentyfour hours a day seven days a week. All of the librarians who participate in the chat service have access to information about the participating NC libraries and their resources.
