After overcoming personal challenges, including struggles with addiction, time in jail, and the loss of her husband to an overdose, Janice committed herself to creating a better future—for both her family and those battling substance use disorders.

She earned her Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC-R) credential and graduated from Central Carolina Community College (CCCC). Within a year of completing her education, Janice began working as a counselor at a treatment center, where her dedication and expertise quickly led to a promotion. Now serving as a *Director for an Addiction Treatment Center in Lee County*, she continues to use her experience, knowledge, and passion to help individuals on

their path to recovery.

Janice's Testimony:

Pursuing my education was a transformative experience that changed my life in ways I could not have imagined. Before my academic journey, I worked a physically demanding job with little pay and no room to grow within the company. I did not believe I was worthy of much more due to my history of substance use and incarceration. Although I had achieved long-term recovery, my family's trust, and employment, I still had a criminal background that I felt prevented me from growing any further.

Still, I took a leap of faith, determined to make a difference in the lives of those who continue to struggle with substance use. Central Carolina Community College offered a program that would ultimately teach me how to do just that, led by instructors who mentored, motivated, and encouraged me to follow that dream. Through my coursework, I gained a deep understanding of treatment modalities, person-centered care, and the application of theoretical concepts in real-world settings. I gained all of this even through personal trials, including parenting, working a full-time job, losing a loved one to an overdose, and caregiving for an aging parent. Many days, I felt overwhelmed, but I persevered to reach my goals.

My academic achievements and hands-on experience assisted me in proving my worth not only to myself but to others. I was offered gainful employment with salary wages before graduation, something I never thought possible with my circumstances. I became a Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor after attending a Quality Assurance meeting with the North Carolina Addiction Specialist Professional Practice Board. I discussed my academic and professional success despite my past mistakes. I have further excelled in my field of study and recently accepted a promotion as the Program Director of my facility.

<u>Imagine this</u>: an individual who, seven years ago, was in prison is now running a program that breaks barriers for others, all because I took a chance and put in the work to achieve my goals. Earning my degree from Central Carolina has opened doors I never fathomed possible and has greatly increased my quality of life. As the Program Director, I continue to apply my academic foundation. My education has empowered me professionally and financially while reinforcing my passion for helping others.
