Pre-Dental Hygiene Program (A55280DH)

The pre-dental hygiene program builds the academic and professional foundation students need to succeed in a Dental Hygiene associate degree program and in their future careers as dental hygienists. It develops the essential knowledge, skills, and habits dental hygienists rely on to provide safe, effective, and patient-centered oral healthcare. Through coursework in anatomy and physiology, chemistry, and microbiology, students gain a strong understanding of the human body, oral-system interactions, and the biological mechanisms that influence health, disease, and infection control. These courses prepare students to apply scientific reasoning, precision, and evidence-based judgment in clinical dental settings.

Communication, critical thinking, and professional readiness are central components of the program. Courses in writing, communication, social psychology, humanities, and math strengthen students' ability to communicate effectively with patients and dental teams, understand patient behavior, and solve practical problems in clinical settings. This coursework also supports success on required licensure exams, including the National Board Dental Hygiene Examination (NBDHE) and the American Board of Dental Examiners (ADEX) clinical examination. Together, the pre-dental hygiene courses prepare students to enter a Dental Hygiene program with confidence and to meet North Carolina licensure requirements.

The pre-Dental Hygiene program is designed as a preparation track and does not lead to a degree. Students who decide not to pursue Dental Hygiene will need to work with their Education Navigator to transition into a different degree pathway.

Planning for Your Future as a Dental Hygienist:

Earning a bachelor's degree builds on the clinical knowledge and patient care experience gained in a Dental Hygiene program and prepares hygienists for expanded roles within today's oral healthcare system. Bachelor's programs related to dental hygiene, such as dental hygiene completion programs, health sciences, public health, or healthcare management, emphasize advanced concepts in oral health promotion, population health, leadership, ethics, research, and healthcare systems. These programs strengthen the ability to think critically, apply evidence-based practice, analyze health data, and understand how social, cultural, and behavioral factors influence oral and overall health outcomes.

At the bachelor's level, dental hygienists develop leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills that support roles beyond direct clinical care, including community oral health education, care coordination, quality improvement, advocacy, and practice management. A bachelor's degree can open the door to higher-paying positions, supervisory and administrative roles, public health and education positions, industry and research support roles, and graduate study in healthcare-related fields. Most importantly, it prepares dental hygienists to take on greater responsibility, adapt to changes in the oral healthcare workforce, and make a broader impact on patient care and population health.

After completing the required courses for admission to the hygiene program, students who plan to earn a bachelor's degree in the future may take the following recommended courses while waiting to begin the program or while enrolled in it. These courses are commonly transferable to universities and may apply toward bachelor's degree requirements, depending on the receiving institution. Please see the college catalog for course descriptions.

The O'Hehir University Bachelor of Science in Oral Health Promotion provides licensed dental hygienists and dental therapists an opportunity to complete their bachelor's degree with a focus on behavior change, oral health advocacy, and professional development. Designed as a degree-completion program for those already practicing clinically, it builds on the clinical foundation and real-world experience gained in an associate degree program, emphasizing reflective learning, guided behavior change, and practical application in oral health promotion. Students engage in weekly online video-conference cohorts and complete a behavior change research project tailored to their interests and practice, fostering critical thinking, implementation skills, and professional communication. The program's flexible, primarily online format makes it accessible to working dental hygienists seeking to expand their role in public health, education, research, and leadership within the profession.

The Appalachian State University Bachelor of Science in Health Care Management is a strong option for dental hygienists who want to broaden their career opportunities beyond chairside care. The program builds on existing healthcare knowledge and prepares graduates for leadership, supervisory, and administrative roles through coursework in healthcare systems, management, finance, quality improvement, and policy. Offered in a flexible, distance-based format, it is well-suited for working dental hygienists and transfer students seeking advancement within healthcare organizations.

Foreign Language Requirement

Spanish is not required for all bachelor's programs, but it is strongly recommended for pre-health students because it significantly improves communication with a large and growing Spanish-speaking patient population. Being able to speak Spanish builds trust, reduces misunderstandings, and helps prevent errors in patient care. Employers in healthcare provide stipends to bilingual employees, making Spanish a powerful advantage for anyone preparing for a health science career. The following Spanish courses are available for pre-health students, but are not always part of a transfer agreement: SPA 111, SPA 112, SPA 211, SPA 212
