Pre-Medical Assisting Program (A55280MA)

The pre-medical assisting program builds the academic and professional foundation students need to succeed in a Medical Assisting diploma or associate degree program and in their future careers as Medical Assistants. It develops the essential knowledge, skills, and habits medical assistants use every day to support safe, efficient, and patient-centered care in clinical settings. Through courses in anatomy and physiology and psychology, students gain a strong understanding of how the human body functions and how biological, psychological, and behavioral factors influence health and illness. These courses help students begin to think like healthcare professionals by applying scientific knowledge, observation, and sound judgment in patient care environments.

Communication, critical thinking, and professional readiness are central components of the program. Courses focused on writing, communication, humanities, and math strengthen students' ability to write clearly, communicate effectively with patients and healthcare teams, analyze information, and solve practical problems commonly encountered in healthcare settings. Additional coursework supports academic success and career exploration by helping students develop strong study habits, time management skills, and professional application materials, while clarifying healthcare career pathways. Together, the pre-medical assisting courses prepare students to enter a Medical Assisting program with confidence and to build the core competencies required for success on the Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) exam, including patient care, communication, professionalism, safety, and foundational clinical knowledge.

The pre-Medical Assisting program is designed as a preparation track and does not lead to a degree. Students who decide not to pursue Medical Assisting will need to work with their Education Navigator to transition into a different degree pathway.

Planning for Your Future as a Medical Assistant:

Earning a bachelor's degree builds on the clinical knowledge and hands-on experience you gain as a Medical Assistant and prepares you for expanded roles within today's healthcare system. Bachelor's programs related to medical assisting, such as health sciences, healthcare management, public health, or allied health leadership, focus on advanced concepts in healthcare delivery, leadership, population health, ethics, research, and healthcare systems. These programs strengthen your ability to think critically, analyze healthcare data, understand policy and compliance, and recognize how social, cultural, and behavioral factors influence patient outcomes.

At the bachelor's level, you will develop leadership and problem-solving skills that allow you to move beyond task-based care and contribute to quality improvement, patient education, care coordination, and organizational effectiveness. You will also gain a broader understanding of how healthcare teams function and how medical assistants support efficiency, safety, and patient satisfaction across clinical settings. A bachelor's degree can open the door to higher-paying positions, supervisory and administrative roles, education and training positions, and graduate study in healthcare-related fields. Most importantly, it prepares you to take on greater responsibility, adapt to a rapidly changing healthcare environment, and make a meaningful impact on both patient care and the healthcare system as a whole.

After completing the required courses for admission to the medical assisting program, students who plan to earn a bachelor's degree in the future may take the following recommended courses while waiting to begin the medical assisting program or while enrolled in the program. These courses are commonly transferable to universities and may apply toward bachelor's degree requirements, depending on the receiving institution. [Appalachian State University - Bachelor of Science in Health Care Management](#)

The Appalachian State University Bachelor of Science in Health Care Management is a strong next step for Medical Assisting students who want to expand their career opportunities beyond clinical roles. The program builds on existing healthcare knowledge and prepares graduates for leadership, supervisory, and administrative positions through coursework in healthcare systems, management, finance, quality improvement, and policy. Offered in a flexible, distance-based format, it is well-suited for working medical assistants and transfer students.

The East Carolina University Bachelor of Science in Health Services Management is a strong option for Medical Assistants who want to move beyond direct patient care while remaining in the healthcare field. The program builds on clinical and operational experience and focuses on healthcare leadership, management, systems, and policy. Offered as an online degree-completion program, it allows working Medical Assistants to continue working while preparing for administrative, supervisory, and care coordination roles.

The North Carolina Wesleyan University Bachelor of Science in Healthcare Administration is a practical pathway for Medical Assistants who want to move into leadership or administrative roles while remaining in healthcare. The program builds on existing clinical experience and focuses on healthcare management, policy, finance, and quality improvement. Designed for working adults, it offers flexible learning options that support career advancement beyond direct patient care.

Foreign Language Requirement

Spanish is not required for all bachelor's programs, but it is strongly recommended for pre-health students because it significantly improves communication with a large and growing Spanish-speaking patient population. Being able to speak Spanish builds trust, reduces misunderstandings, and helps prevent errors in patient care. Employers in healthcare provide stipends to bilingual employees, making Spanish a powerful advantage for anyone preparing for a health science career. The following Spanish courses are available for pre-health students, but are not always part of a transfer agreement: SPA 111, SPA 112, SPA 211, SPA 212

All universities will accept general education credit, although the number of credits that transfer may vary by institution. If you are unsure which university you plan to attend, a safe option is to choose courses identified as part of the Universal General Education Transfer Component (UGETC), which are noted at the end of the course description.
