



# Program Planning Guide

## Pre-Practical Nursing Program (A55280PN)

The pre-practical nursing program provides the academic and professional foundation needed to succeed in the Practical Nursing program and begin a career as a licensed practical nurse. Coursework in anatomy and physiology, psychology, and foundational healthcare concepts helps students understand how the human body functions and how physical, mental, and social factors influence health. The program emphasizes critical thinking, clinical reasoning, and attention to detail, which are essential for safe and effective patient care. Students also begin developing professional behaviors such as accountability, ethical decision-making, and teamwork that are expected in clinical nursing environments.

Communication, professionalism, and academic readiness are also key components of the program. Courses in writing and career preparation strengthen communication, study skills, time management, and personal responsibility, while Nurse Aide I offers early hands-on clinical experience that builds confidence and patient care skills. Students gain exposure to real-world healthcare settings that help them understand the pace, expectations, and responsibilities of nursing practice. Together, these courses prepare students to enter the Practical Nursing program ready to master core competencies tested on the NCLEX PN exam, including safety, communication, psychosocial integrity, and physiological adaptation.

The pre-Practical Nursing program is designed as a preparation track and does not lead to a degree. Students who decide not to pursue nursing will need to work with their Education Navigator to transition into a different degree pathway.

A minimum grade of B must be earned in all science classes (BIO 168 and BIO 169) for full acceptance. A minimum grade of C must be earned in all pre-program classes.

#### Medical Math Elective

A medical math course builds the skills needed to work accurately and confidently in healthcare. The course develops the ability to estimate and verify calculations, convert between measurement systems using dimensional analysis, and apply fractions, percentages, and proportions to real medical situations such as interpreting labels and calculating medication dosages. Instruction also includes reading charts and graphs and using basic statistical and geometric concepts that support problem-solving in clinical settings. Completing this course provides a strong foundation that makes future math classes easier, strengthens confidence, and helps prevent common calculation errors. The following math course is available for pre-health science students: MAT 110 (LN1 or LN2 only)

## Planning for Your Future as a Nurse:

Earning an Associate Degree in Nursing builds on the knowledge and clinical experience gained in the Practical Nursing program and prepares students to become a Registered Nurse. The program focuses on advanced patient care, clinical decision-making, and evidence-based practice through coursework and clinical training across key nursing areas. Students develop the technical, critical thinking, and communication skills needed for independent nursing practice. Graduates are eligible to sit for the NCLEX RN licensure exam and gain access to expanded career opportunities, increased earning potential, and advancement within the nursing profession.

If you intend to pursue an Associate in Applied Science in Nursing degree and are interested in taking additional classes while you are waiting to enter the nursing program, these are the required courses for CCCC's program. Please see the college catalog for course descriptions.

### Foreign Language Elective

Spanish is not required for an ADN program, but it is strongly recommended for pre-health students because it significantly improves communication with a large and growing Spanish-speaking patient population. Being able to speak Spanish builds trust, reduces misunderstandings, and helps prevent errors in patient care. Employers in healthcare provide stipends to bilingual employees, making Spanish a powerful advantage for anyone preparing for a health science career. The following Spanish courses are available for pre-health students: SPA 111, SPA 112, SPA 211, SPA 212.
