Pre-Veterinary Medical Technology (A55280VT)

The pre-veterinary medical technology program provides the academic and professional foundation needed for success in the Veterinary Medical Technology (VMT) program and a future career as a registered veterinary technician. Foundational science and lab courses introduce core chemistry and biology concepts, how substances interact in the body, and the accurate use of basic laboratory and safety procedures. Students begin developing clinical reasoning skills through observation, evidence-based thinking, and problem-solving, along with the study habits, time management, and professionalism required for the VMT curriculum.

Communication, critical thinking, and ethical understanding are essential components of the program. General education courses strengthen written and verbal communication, teamwork, data interpretation, and dosage calculation skills that are critical in veterinary practice and reinforced throughout the VMT curriculum and preparation for the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE). Coursework in psychology and ethics supports effective client interaction, compassionate decision-making, and professional judgment, helping students enter the VMT program with confidence and begin developing the competencies evaluated on the VTNE.

The pre-Vet Med program is designed as a preparation track and does not lead to a degree. Students who decide not to pursue this profession will need to work with their Education Navigator to transition into a different degree pathway.

Planning for Your Future as an RVT:

Earning a Bachelor of Science in Veterinary Technology builds on the skills and experience you gained in your associate-level coursework and prepares you for greater responsibility in the animal-health field. In a bachelor's program, you'll take advanced classes in areas like pharmacology, anesthesia, diagnostic imaging, public health, leadership, and practice management. These courses strengthen your clinical judgment, improve your ability to make evidence-based decisions, and help you understand how environmental and public health factors affect animal well-being. A bachelor's degree also opens the door to higher-paying positions, supervisory and teaching roles, and research opportunities. Most importantly, it helps you become a more skilled, confident veterinary professional who can provide high-quality care and make a meaningful impact on the animals and communities you serve.

After completing the required courses for admission to the Vet Med program, students who plan to earn a bachelor's degree in the future may take the following recommended courses while waiting to begin the program or while enrolled in the program. These courses are commonly transferable to universities and may apply toward bachelor's degree requirements, depending on the receiving institution. Graduates finish with a well-rounded education that enhances their clinical skills and prepares them for leadership roles in animal health care settings, with real-world application of classroom learning through supervised practical experience.

The St. Petersburg College Bachelor of Applied Science in Veterinary Technology offers a fully online pathway for credentialed veterinary technicians to advance into specialized and managerial roles within the profession. Building on technical skills acquired in an accredited Associate in Science Veterinary Technology program, this terminal degree deepens students' expertise in areas critical to modern veterinary practice, including clinical techniques, hospital management, pharmacology, and professional communication. The curriculum features subplans that allow focused study in clinical or administrative tracks while maintaining comprehensive general education and elective requirements, positioning graduates to contribute as highly capable, contributing veterinary professionals.

Foreign Language Requirement

Spanish is not required for all bachelor's programs, but it is strongly recommended for pre-health students because it significantly improves communication with a large and growing Spanish-speaking patient population. Being able to speak Spanish builds trust, reduces misunderstandings, and helps prevent errors in patient care. Employers in healthcare provide stipends to bilingual employees, making Spanish a powerful advantage for anyone preparing for a health science career. The following Spanish courses are available for pre-health students, but are not always part of a transfer agreement: SPA 111, SPA 112, SPA 211, SPA 212

All universities will accept general education credit, although the number of credits that transfer may vary by institution. If you are unsure which university you plan to attend, a safe option is to choose courses identified as part of the Universal General Education Transfer Component (UGETC), which are noted at the end of the course description.
